Before the civic election forum, at a community league filled to capacity, we made it clear that urban renewal was an important topic for the electorate. We now have a golden opportunity for a World Class Urban Avenue, designed with our input, to suite our needs and aspirations. Update on 101 Avenue Redevelopment

The redevelopment of 101 Avenue crossed another hurdle on June 5, 2018, with the City of Edmonton's Urban Planning Committee (UPC) voting at their regular meeting that day to have the Civic Administration develop a capital budget profile for the project to be considered by Council this fall for inclusion in the 2019-2022 City capital budget.

Residents of the 5 communities in Greater Hardisty (Forest Heights, Terrace Heights, Fulton Place, Capilano and Gold Bar) may recall the fanfare with which the City initiated the 101 Avenue Corridor Study in 2016. The study was originally intended as a pilot project to support ELEVATE, a City Council initiative aimed at engaging community organizations in the creation of physical and social environments within their own communities that would meet all of their needs during their entire lifetime. The aspirations of ELEVATE also intersected with the goals of the Greater Hardisty Community Sustainability Coalition (GHCSC), a grassroots group originally organized in 2014 to stop local school closures in the Hardisty area.

Through 2 workshops at Forest Heights Elementary School in July and September of 2016, planners from the City sought input from Hardisty residents on measures that should be taken to revitalize the 101 Avenue corridor from 50 Street in the east to 79 Street in the west. Supplemented with additional Pop-up Engagements throughout the community that summer, both workshops were lively affairs and each drew over 200 participants. City planning staff then used the comments from residents to develop a draft concept for the 101 Avenue corridor which was then refined and presented back to the community at an open house in early 2017. That event also drew over 200 participants.

In draft form, the corridor study was completed in mid 2017 and contained a multitude of redevelopment recommendations aimed at revitalizing 101 Avenue, including:

--redesigning the roadway, including the intersections at Terrace Road and 84 Street, to reduce the number of vehicle lanes and adding a separated bike lane on each side;

--support for more medium density residential development along the corridor to provide diverse housing for seniors, families, etc.;

--ensuring commercial developments are easy to walk to, attractive and provide services for residents; and

--increasing area accessibility, including making better use of Fulton Ravine, for people walking, biking and taking transit.

Since its completion however, the study draft has languished on the shelf, thus prompting Ben Henderson, the Councillor for Ward 8, to request an update report in early 2018, on its status from the Civic Administration. That report, publicly released on May 31, was considered at the City's Urban Planning Committee meeting on June 5. In addition to the 4 regular members of the UPC, the Councillors from 6 other Wards also attended the meeting.

The Administration's report recommended against taking any immediate action on 101 Avenue and argued that its priority for redevelopment should await the identification of a nodes and corridors network for the City as an element of the next Municipal Development Plan (MDP) slated for completion in 2020. MDPs, written every 10 years, are planning documents intended to guide municipal growth over the succeeding decade. Moreover, the update report also indicated that since 101 Avenue is not considered to be a designated Main Street, like Jasper Avenue or Whyte Avenue, the limited capital funding available may preclude the City from being able to move forward with its redevelopment.

In opposition to the Administration's update report, the GHCSC registered a block of residents to speak in favour of taking action on the study at the UPC meeting. Speaking for GHCSC were: Jill Schlender (Capilano), Miles Berry (Fulton Place), Sheila Thompson (Fulton Place), Connie Lussier (Terrace Heights), Sharon Whillans (Terrace Heights), the Reverend Jonathan Crane (St. Augustine's Anglican Church), Angela Mao (Forest Heights), Abigail, Sarah and Rebecca Lechelt (Terrace Heights) and Allan Yee (Capilano). Each speaker spent their allotted 5 minutes concentrating on a specific aspect of the study background and corridor needs, including the last 4 successive decades of residential population decline in Hardisty,

the need for additional senior housing options in the area as a catalyst for housing stock turnover in Hardisty, how engaged residents were in providing input into the corridor study, the potential of the area for redevelopment, the current unsafe nature of 101 Avenue for pedestrians and cyclists, the need for affordable housing in the area, and ways to make the 101 Avenue corridor more kid friendly as well as increasing the accessibility of the area for pedestrians and cyclists through the construction of additional urban infrastructure. The GHCSC's request at the end of their block speaking time was for the Urban Planning Committee to direct the Administration to develop a capital budget profile for implementing the corridor study to be brought back for this fall's budget debate. Two outside speakers, Ryan Eldick, a planning consultant with Invistec, and Kirsten Goa, a community public engagement activist, also spoke to UPC in favour of the City supporting implementation of the corridor study's recommendations.

In the end, following debate and questions

asked by various Councillors of the registered speakers as well as the Civic Administration, the Urban Planning Committee did pass a motion to have the Administration bring forward a budget profile to Council this fall for moving forward with the 101 Avenue Corridor Study. A second motion was also carried to have the Administration prepare another report by mid October on opportunities to advance short term actions to move the 101 Avenue corridor vision forward. In the interim, members of the GHCSC continue to discuss ways to continue the momentum on the 101 Avenue redevelopment project and ensure that it actually be approved this fall for inclusion in the City's 2019-2022 capital budget.

one purpose," Henderson told the committee earlier in the day, as reported by Global Edmonton. "That purpose is no longer really functioning, which creates this opportunity to reimagine it."

Committee chair, Coun. Michael Walters, said it was good to work with a united community that welcomes change and greater density.

"What this was today was a group of citizens that have been working in the aftermath of a bunch of school closures, to reimagine their neighbourhood, and to own up to the question, how do we get more young families into our neighbourhood? How do we increase density in our neighbourhood in a way that people can get behind?"

City staff will do more public consultation over the next few months before making recommendations.

The Emotions of Food

We all have a relationship with food. It's a necessity of life that nourishes us. It may also bring us joy as it can delight the senses and stir pleasurable emotions. Some people may have an unhealthy relationship with food that can trap them in an emotional cycle of anxiety and shame.

"One estimate I've seen is that as much as 65 per cent of the population has some dissatisfaction in the way they manage their eating," says Mallory Becker, an Edmontonbased registered psychologist with an interest in eating disorders.

"This can range from life-threatening conditions such as anorexia nervosa, to situations where people feel a lot of guilt about missing the eating goals they've set for themselves. They get caught up in an idealized picture of what they think they should be doing, then crash when they've failed to meet those unrealistic goals."

One way to improve your relationship with food is to be more aware of your eating habits and understand what triggers you to reach for a tub of ice cream or bag of chips.

Small changes in your daily habits can lead to positive results. Instead of being constantly (and somewhat mindlessly) glued to a screen, you can reclaim your place in "the here and now" by conscious deep breathing, mindful eating, or using time to plan some healthy meals.

"For long-term success, it's better to set reasonable goals and look at healthy eating as a lifestyle change. Self-compassion is very important," Becker says.



All types of play build skills

Play is the foundation on which children build lifelong skills and positive relationships with themselves and others.

Who will be the princess and who will be the pony? How will we get across this lava to safety? In a make-believe world, those kinds of big, creative decisions build healthy bodies and minds. Children learn to build and explore their world and their relationships with others.

"Children are usually told to brush their teeth and go to school, where to sit, which clothes to wear and when to go to bed," says Laura Crawford, program facilitator with Alberta Health Services' Early Childhood program. "Play lets them take the lead. It helps them balance those daily routines and unwind by doing things the way they want to."

When kids lead play, they develop selfesteem and confidence. They learn to be creative and solve problems; their language skills grow. And when they name objects and describe their feelings, they make vital braincell connections that support learning and understanding.

Children play in different ways. Active play is running, jumping, kicking, throwing and catching. It gives children the chance to explore how their body moves, and move in increasingly complex ways. Pretend play is using imagination and acting out scenes and situations. It lays the foundation for language, literacy and problem-solving.

Creative play is making arts and crafts, building sandcastles and more. It lets children use their hands and minds to create. And it helps them learn to express themselves and tune their fine motor skills. Play can also provide a valuable emotional release. Children may not always have the words to express their feelings, but they can express them by playing a role, drawing a picture or telling a story. By playing together, kids learn to empathize with others and understand the giveand-take of relationships.

"The play experience helps children to broaden their understanding of the world. They learn how to get along with others, share, make friends, take turns and express themselves and their ideas," Crawford says.

"Play is the foundation on which children build lifelong skills and positive relationships with others and themselves. They need to play every day."

Relationships build good mental health

Resiliency helps with life's bumps and potholes

A child's foundation for good mental health is built early in life through his experiences, including his relationships with his parents, family, caregivers, teachers and other children.

These relationships are essential to his development and help him build resiliency—the ability to bounce back from setbacks and cope with life's ups and downs. Resiliency is built by certain skills such as problem solving, empathy and emotional regulation, which is the ability to show emotions in ways that won't hurt oneself or others.

A child with resiliency is able to react confidently, positively and adapt well to change when he hits bumps and potholes on the road of life. Resilience is also a buffer against the harmful effects of adverse childhood experiences.

"Our mental health depends on our relationships with other people from the very beginning," says Dr. Carole-Anne Hapchyn, an infant psychiatrist in Edmonton and a clinical professor of psychiatry and pediatrics at the University of Alberta. "When you are resilient, you've got more in the bank to cope," she says. It's like a scale, with the positive things in a child's life going to one side of the scale and the negative going to the other side. Resilience is the movable tipping point that gives a child the ability to have positive experiences outweigh the negative.

One of the best ways to build up the positive side of the scale is through serve and return interactions (see page 11). The key to this backand-forth communication is watching for and responding to children's cues, Hapchyn says. "Be sensitive and observant to what children are trying to tell you."

Serve and return helps build a strong relationship between an adult and child, creating an emotional bond that gives that child the strength, trust and security he needs.

Ask Charles

My real estate agent gave me a comparative market analysis when we set the listing price for my home, but now a buyer's lender wants an appraisal done on the property. What's the difference?

That's a good question. There are some very important distinctions between a comparative market analysis (CMA) and an appraisal.

A CMA is a method of property valuation real estate professionals use to estimate the value of residential properties; a CMA provides a range of value. This helps sellers set a listing price for their property. CMAs examine the prices at which similar properties in the same area have recently sold.

A real estate appraisal, on the other hand, is a formal, impartial estimate or opinion of value, usually in writing, of a specific property, as of a specific date, which is supported by the presentation and analysis of relevant data pertinent to a property. Appraisals provide a defined value for the property, rather than a range as in a CMA.

Real estate appraisers in Alberta need a licence as an appraiser from the Real Estate Council of Alberta. They require special training and experience before they become full appraisers. Their methods for providing an appraisal go beyond using the sold prices of similar properties to arrive at an appropriate listing price.

When a real estate professional provides a CMA to a seller or potential seller, they need to ensure the seller understands the following: it hasn't been prepared by a licensed real estate appraiser; it doesn't comply with appraisal standards; no one should rely on it as an appraisal; and, it can't be used for financing, civil proceedings, income tax purposes, or financial reporting purposes.

The only thing a CMA is supposed to be used for is to help set a listing price. That's why a buyer's lender may want to do an independent appraisal on a property. Simply put, the lender wants to make sure the property is worth what the buyer is paying for it. Just because other homes nearby have sold for a similar amount, it doesn't mean a lender will be satisfied the home is worth what the buyer is paying for it.

If the buyer were to default on the mortgage and the property were to go into foreclosure, the lender wants to make sure it can recoup the money it has lent on the property. The lender will be more confident in its lending by reviewing an appraisal for the property.

HDC Updates

Holyrood Gardens

Since its ratification in April, 2017; The Holyrood Development Committee has devoted the majority of its time and resources to the Holyrood Gardens project. Thousands of volunteer hours have been spent on this specific development. Community members provided generous donations to reimburse costs incurred and provide additional resources. The truly generous and caring nature of our community was also showcased by stakeholders who contributed prize donations, meeting spaces and sponsorship letters.

At the Public Hearing in November, City Council voted that the proposal be sent back for rework. The Holyrood Development Committee, City Planning and Regency Developments engaged from early 2018 to redesign and refine the Holyrood Gardens proposal. On May 2, Regency presented their revised proposal to the community at a public open house. It was clear that the developer's proposal was not in line with the community vision or the Holyrood Development Committee's feedback. Many articles emerged such as the CTV news' story 'A step backwards:' Holyrood residents disappointed with developer's new design' https://edmonton. ctvnews.ca/a-step-backwards-holyroodresidents-disappointed-with-developer-snew-design-1.3913855 As detailed in the Edmonton Journal article, 'City committee rejects reworked plan for Holyrood Gardens development' http://edmontonjournal.com/business/commercial-real-estate/city-committee-rejects-reworked-planfor-holyrood-gardens-development ,the Edmonton Design Committee felt that the revised proposal was aimed at providing density rather than a creative design.

The week following the May 2nd Holyrood Gardens open house, Regency Developments chose to revise and submit a new version of the proposal. The HDC asked that developer consider the recommendations and suggestions made by the Edmonton Design Committee on May 1st, 2018 while making changes to the proposal. The HDC also asked that Regency take the revised proposal to the Edmonton Design Committee for review.

The revised proposal was brought back to the EDC on June 5th, 2018. After the review, the EDC provided another lengthy letter that outlined many of the same concerns they had

with the previous proposal from May. The EDC's recommendation, was again, one of non-support. The EDC acknowledged and appreciated that the project had evolved since May, but felt that the developer was attempting to buffer the existing neighborhood from the development rather than integrate the development with the surrounding communities. The committee felt that significant refinement and/or redesign of the project was still needed. Their comments from June 5th can be reviewed by searching Edmonton Design Committee June 5 2018 minutes on the City of Edmonton's site https://www. edmonton.ca/

The HDC additionally asked that the developer bring the new proposal forward and share it with the community. As there was insufficient time to hold a Public Open House to collect feedback on the proposal, an Information Session was held on June 27th, 2018 in the Holyrood School Gymnasium. The Information Session provided information on the most current version of the proposal for anyone wishing to write letters to City Council or speak at the Public Hearing. The HDC printed and delivered flyers to homes in Holyrood and Strathearn to encourage community members to attend both the Public Information Session and the Public Hearing.

Upon reviewing the final version of the DC2, the HDC felt that substantial changes to the proposal were still required. The Holyrood Development Committee referred back to the expert advice of the Edmonton Design Committee and decided to take a formal position of non-support on the application.

The revised proposal was scheduled to be heard at Public Hearing on July 9, 2018. Please visit the HDC's website to find out what happened.

8302 95 Avenue

Urbis Developments has submitted an application to rezone 8302 95 Ave (East of St. Luke's Church). The proposed DC2 is based off of the RA7 zone with some minor changes, taking in to account the Transit Oriented Development zone. Urbis Developments, and their consultants met with members of HDC and representatives from the church prior to submitting the application. The developer sought and incorporated feedback from the HDC. The developer has provided the HDC with an information package with details of the proposed development, see HDC's website for more information.

5. Minimizing barking. The City of Edmonton website indicates that "Barking is natural for dogs when they are bored, lonely or want to alert their owners of something. However, excessive barking can disturb and upset your neighbours. Make sure your dog is a good neighbour by addressing excessive barking through dog training, socializing, exercising and family interaction".

Backyard Play Safety

With summer approaching, Emergency Medical Services (EMS) would like to encourage parents and caregivers to ensure their backyard play areas are made safe for children. Although direct supervision is the best method to reduce the chance of injury, ensure your play equipment in your yard is in good repair and is suitable for the age and skill of the children using it. Check play equipment often; replace or repair any worn or broken parts. Set up play equipment over top a nine inch layer of shock-absorbing material, which extends six feet out in all directions from the play area.

Water hazards

• Drowning contributes to unintentional injury-related death among children ages one to four;

• Children can drown in just a few centimetres of water if it covers their mouth and nose;

mouth and nose; • Ensure all backyard swimming pools are fenced. The fence must be at least

1.8 metres(*) high and have a self-latching, self-closing, lockable gate.

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Lawn and garden tools

• Keep young children away from outdoor power equipment;

• Serious burns may result from touching hot engine surfaces;

• Ensure that all sharp tools, fuel, chemicals, and other hazardous substances are stored in a secure, locked area. A simple latch may not be sufficient.

Insect bites and stings

• Minimize the risk of attracting insects by not wearing strong perfumes or scented lotions;

• Avoid wearing brightly coloured clothing outdoors;

Consider destroying or relocating hives and nests situated near your home;
To avoid injury through inadvertently stepping on a stinging insect always wear footwear outdoors;

• If your child has received an 'EpiPen, Junior' prescription from your physician (for anaphylactic reactions only) ensure they understand when and how to use it;

• If your child experiences a severe reaction to an insect sting, or other environmental cause, seek medical attention, or call 9-1-1.

One of Edmonton's Hidden Treasures



The Orchid Collection at the Muttart. Do you find orchids fascinating? Did you know one the top ten orchid collections in North America is right here in Ed-

monton? Can I tell you more?

The Orchid Species Preservation Foundation (OSPF) is a non-profit, charitable, volunteer foundation that has been in partnership with City of Edmonton since 1991. We own and co-manage with the Muttart staff the orchid collection housed at the Muttart Conservatory. The collection holds approximately 4,500 plants representing 170 genera and 1200 species of orchids from around the globe.

The collection is kept in a purpose built orchid greenhouse at the back of the Muttart Conservatory highlighted in yellow in the picture opposite. It was built by the OSPF and Muttart and was officially opened in 2004. It is off limits to the general public and as such only a fraction of the plants are on display in the tropical and temperate pyramids on any given day. The collection has grown through generous donations of plants by many orchid growers and by purchasing new species at orchid shows.

Some flowers are very large, but many are miniscule often the size of your pinkie fingernail or even smaller.

The OSPF also has an Orchid Resource Centre located at 4457 99th Street that houses our propagation facility where we grow orchids from seeds, our library, office, demonstration area for talks and potting session and workshop for building displays and promotional materials.

In addition to caring for the orchids at the Muttart, the OSPF also uses the collection

to educate our youth. In schools, the OSPF takes examples of orchids into the class and gives talks tailored to the grade level and requests from the teachers. We have engaged students from grade 4 to grade 12 in art as well as science classes. We allow the students to touch the plants, smell them and even dissect some the main parts of the plant to see how they work. The students invariably go home with a orchid that they have potted.

At the University level, we have partnered with MacEwan University on several projects. One was taking advantage of our unique collection of Masdevallia and Dracula orchids to extract DNA and search the DNA structure for a sequence that can be used to positively identify a species when not in bloom.

We have also expanded this partnership to include the Wagner Natural Area Society, the Foundation for Orchid Research and Conservation and the Smithsonian's North American Orchid Conservation Centre to investigate Canada's native orchids and explore if we can successfully propagate and grow our native species in the lab and then transplant them back into the wild.

Yes, Alberta has 28 native orchids and some like the yellow lady slipper you can grow in your garden. They are available in the local garden centres or speciality native orchid growers like Shawn Hillis in Calgary (www.gardenslippers.com)

PLEASE DO NOT take them from the wild.

Other ways the OSPF tries to make the collection more accessible to the public is by attending orchid shows and also putting on our own orchid exhibit in the fall. Orchid Shows tend to be focus on flower judging and awards and our orchid exhibit tends to focus on showing the diversity of the orchids and





engaging our youth with the hope of igniting a passion for these unusual plants.

We also like to tour parties around the collection. In past we have tour school groups, university groups, orchid judges, president of the American Orchid Society, senior's groups. During the summer on the second Wednesday of the month, the OSPF gives an orchid related talk as part of the Muttart's Adult Only Evenings. The talk is then followed by a tour of the orchid greenhouse.
